Families of Flight 93 say Pa. memorial is on track

Families of Flight 93 tell Congress that 9/11 memorial planned for Pennsylvania is on track

WASHINGTON (AP) -- Families of those who died on United Airlines Flight 93 told lawmakers Thursday that plans for a 9/11 memorial at the crash site in Pennsylvania are on track.

The memorial's first phase should open on the 10th anniversary of the 2001 terrorist attacks, the group Families of Flight 93 told a House committee.

"Though we have made great progress, continued federal support is vital to ensuring we remain on track and reach that goal," said the group's president, Gordon Felt.

Felt's brother, Edward Felt, was one of the 40 passengers and crew who died when the plane crashed into a field near rural Shanksville, about 65 miles southwest of Pittsburgh.

A groundbreaking ceremony for a National Park Service memorial at the crash site was held last November.

Don't mess with a Helicopter Pilot

Retired Marine and former Pan Am/Delta Pilot John Lovell is top gun at Subway sandwich shop

Plantation, Florida: Last week police were called to investigate an attempted armed robbery: The 71year-old retired Marine who opened fire on two robbers at a Plantation, Florida, Subway shop late Wednesday, killing one and critically wounding the other, is described as John Lovell, a former helicopter pilot for two presidents. He doesn't drink, he doesn't smoke, and he works out every day. Mr. Lovell was a man of action Wednesday night.

According to Plantation police, two masked gunmen came into the Subway at 1949 N. Pine Rd. just after 11 p.m. There was a lone diner, Mr. Lovell, who was finishing his meal. After robbing the cashier, the two men attempted to shove Mr. Lovell into a bathroom and rob him as well. They got his money, but then Mr. Lovell pulled his handgun and opened fire. He shot one of the thieves in the head and chest and the other in the head.

When police arrived, they found one of the men in the shop, K-9 Units found the other in the bushes of a nearby business. They also found cash strewn around the front of the sandwich shop according to Detective Robert Rettig of the Plantation Police Department..

Both men were taken to the Broward General Medical Center, where one, Donicio Arrindell, 22, of North Lauderdale died. The other, 21-year-old Frederick Gadson of Fort Lauderdale is in critical but stable condition.

A longtime friend of Lovell was not surprised to hear what happened. The friend said, "He'd give you the shirt off his back, but he'd be mad as hell if someone tried to take the shirt off his back."

Mr. Lovell was a pilot in the Marine Corps, flying former Presidents John F. Kennedy and Lyndon B. Johnson. He later worked as a pilot for Pan Am and Delta Airlines.

He is not expected to be charged authorities said. "He was in fear for his life," Detective Rettig said, "These criminals ought to realize that most men in their 70's have military backgrounds and aren't intimidated by idiots."

Something tells me this old Marine wasn't 'in fear for his life', even though his life was definitely at risk. The only thing he could be charged with is participating in an unfair fight. One 71- year young Marine against two punks. Two head shots and one center body mass shot... Outstanding shooting! That'll teach them not to get between a Marine and his meal.

Florida law allows eligible citizens to carry a concealed weapon. Don't you just love a story with a happy ending?

He is graduate of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point. Sullivan previously deployed to Iraq in 2004 and in 2007.

The following is a portion of an article in The Journal News on March 21, 2010.

(You may never complain about traffic and driving again. Most importantly, it is a sobering reminder of what our military encounters everyday and, for some, years due to multiple year-long tours.)

"FOB FALCON, BAGHDAD, March 18 —

What I'd like to share with you this week is how we move around Iraq. We have two primary means of getting places: by helicopter and by ground movement. Helicopter movement is always the preferred way to go. It is far safer than driving...Like all air travel, however, you are limited by the weather and the amount of people or equipment you can move at once. That is why we do most of our movement by ground.

Driving in Iraq is not like hopping in the car back home. Our drive today lasted 20 minutes. The preparation beforehand, however, started two hours prior to our departure. Our vehicles, heavily up-armored Humvees for this trip, are prepared in advance. Weapons are checked, radio systems tested and adjustments on where every piece of equipment within the vehicle are made. Some typical equipment includes first aid kits, stretchers, tool kits, water, GPS systems and extra ammunition.

A manifest confirms who is travelling on the convoy, along with weapon serial number and their blood type in case someone is injured during the journey. The leader gives a convoy brief, sort of an itinerary for the movement. Next, the convoy leader reviews what to do if something happens. The crews then rehearse what to do if 1) the Humvee rolls over (hang on tight!), 2) if the Humvee is hit by an improvised explosive device, 3) how to load a wounded soldier into one of the Humvees, and 4) what to do if a fire breaks out in the Humvee.

Personal equipment includes a helmet, fireproof uniforms, body armor with four heavy bulletproof plates, fire resistant gloves, and protective eye wear. Finally, equipment carrying gear holding everything from first-aid kits to ammunition is put on over the body armor. Soldiers climb into their assigned seats within the cramped vehicle.

Heavily armored doors, each weighing a few hundred pounds, are pulled shut and the vehicles start to move. One last stop before you leave the heavily guarded gate: test fire your machine guns to make sure you can defend yourself. After a burst of fire and a shower of empty shell casings into the Humvee through the turret, we venture into the dangerous world of Iraq.

I have yet to have a leisurely ride in Iraq. Every person from the gunner sticking out of the Humvee to the passenger in the back seat (usually me), is looking for signs of a potential attacker. You peer warily through inch thick bulletproof glass scanning for any potential threats. The trash-strewn buildings and rubble-filled streets offer an infinite amount of places to hide explosives or an attacker.

Many questions go back and forth between the crew headsets, and through your own mind. Is that rock an IED? What is taped up onto that light pole? Does that vehicle look heavily weighed down because of explosives ... a possible car bomb? No, there are three people in the car so chances are it is not a car bomb. Why did that man in the black robe look at our Humvee twice? Is he holding prayer beads in his hand? What about that trash on the side of the road ... is there something hidden under there?

Heads up, we are passing under an overpass. Look up to make sure there is no one on it, ready to throw a grenade down on top of us. Be sure to swerve while under the bridge to confuse a potential attacker as we come out on the other side. Look up, there are our two Apache helicopters providing us support ... phew. I feel a little better knowing those heavily armed helicopters are with us.

Only when we enter into the gates of JSS Doura, safely behind guarded walls, do we all breathe easier. But in the back of your mind, you know you'll do the same thing to get back to FOB Falcon in just a few hours.

Imagine the above sequence on every drive you make into Iraq. The moment you stop acting paranoid is the moment something deadly may happen. Something as simple as a 20-minute drive takes literally hours of preparation and drains you physically and mentally.

Years ago, you rarely saw Iraqi civilian vehicles on the road, now the streets are packed. The traffic is almost at the density of the West Side Highway midday.

We have over 2 million people living in our area, and the majority of them drive. The huge increase of Iraqi traffic on the roads is a positive sign. It indicates the Iraqi people feel more secure and safe enough to venture out. For us, however, it makes any sort of traveling an adventure, and a potentially dangerous one.

Yet the soldiers go through this every day, for an entire year. Some of them are on their third or even fourth tour in Iraq. The soldiers put their helmets on and continue to venture outside the wire.

I watch patrol after patrol go out to conduct missions ranging from delivering humanitarian supplies, to meeting with local business leaders to plan on rebuilding communities to hunting for terrorists in the deep of the Baghdad night.

Please keep these soldiers and their families in your thoughts, dear reader, as you go through your day today. We ask for nothing more than that. Until next week, give my regards to Rockland."

She quickly becomes an old widow, her face wrinkled and sad, before the image turns into a monument to an Unknown Soldier.

This outdoor scene becomes framed by a window as if the viewer is looking out on the monument from within a house.

In the final scene, a mother and child appear inside and a man standing outside, with his hands pressed against the glass, saying good-bye.

The Great Patriotic War, as it is called in Ukraine, resulted in one in four of the population being killed with eight to 11 million deaths out of a population of 42 million.

Kseniya Simonova says:

"I find it difficult enough to create art using paper and pencils or paintbrushes, but using sand and fingers is beyond me. The art, especially when the war is used as the subject matter, even brings some audience members to tears. And there's surely no bigger compliment."
